

PROJECT: Hold Anything Tote

Sew a stylish tote that can used to hold projects, groceries, children's toys, and more.

FABRICS are from the Hooked collection by Mister Domestic for Art Gallery Fabrics (artgalleryfabrics.com).



FINISHED BAG: 16×14×4"

MATERIALS

Yardages and cutting instructions are based on 42" of usable fabric width.

- □ 1/2 yard yellow print (bag body, handles)
- □ ½ yard purple print (bag body)
- □ 5/8 yard cream print (lining)
- Heavyweight stabilizer (such as ByAnnie's Soft and Stable) or quilt batting

CUT FABRICS

Cut pieces in the following order.

From yellow print, cut:

- \Box 1-4½×16½" rectangle
- \square 2-3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ×15 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles
- \Box 2-2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ×20 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles
- \Box 4-2½×12½" rectangles

From purple print, cut:

 \square 2-12½×16½" rectangles

From cream print, cut:

- \square 2-14 $\frac{1}{2}$ ×20 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles
- \Box 1-4 $\frac{1}{2}$ ×16 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle

From heavyweight stabilizer or batting, cut:

- □ 1-22×34" rectangle
- \Box 2-1½×15" rectangles

ASSEMBLE BAG BODY

Measurements include 1/4" seam allowances. Sew with right sides together unless otherwise stated.

Press seams in directions indicated by arrows on diagrams. If no direction is specified, press seam toward darker fabric.

Referring to Diagram 1, sew yellow print 2½×12½" rectangles to short edges of purple print 12½×16½" rectangle. Add yellow print 2½×20½" rectangle to top edge to make bag front. The bag front should be 14½×20½" including seam allowances. Repeat to make bag back.

2 Referring to **Diagram 2**, center and sew yellow print $4\frac{1}{2} \times 16\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle to bottom edges of bag front and bag back.

Z Referring to **Diagram 3**, center Step 2 unit right side up atop stabilizer or batting 22×34" rectangle; baste. Quilt as desired.

Trim excess stabilizer or batting even with fabric edges.

5 Fold quilted unit in half with right side inside. Align bag front and back seams; sew side edges together (**Diagram 4**) to make the bag body. Press seams open.

6 To shape a flat bag bottom, at one corner match center of yellow print bag bottom rectangle with side seam, creating a flattened edge (Diagram 5). Sew raw edges together. Repeat with remaining corner. Turn bag body right side out.

ASSEMBLE LINING

Referring to **Diagram 6**, center and sew cream print $4\frac{1}{2}\times16\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle to long edges of cream print $14\frac{1}{2}\times20\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles.

2 Fold Step 1 unit in half with right side inside; align edges. Join side edges, leaving a 4" opening in one edge for turning **(Diagram 7)**. Referring to Assemble Bag Body, Step 6, shape a flat bottom to make lining. Do not turn lining right side out.

FINISH BAG

1 Insert bag body into lining with right sides together; align side seams (Diagram 8). Pin top edges and sew together.

2 Turn right side out through opening in lining; stitch opening closed.

Insert lining into bag body; press top edge. Topstitch 1/4" from top edge.

Press under 1/4" on all edges of a yellow print 31/2×151/2" rectangle (Diagram 9). Place a stabilizer or batting 11/2×15" rectangle along one fold. Fold rectangle in half lengthwise to encase stabilizer; press. Topstitch 1/8" from all edges to make a handle. Repeat to make a second handle.

Referring to **Diagram 10**, pin ends of one handle to top edge of bag body with ends just above purple print and 5" between them. Topstitch handle to bag in a rectangle shape filled with an X. Repeat with second handle to complete bag.








