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Project: Southwestern Circles Throw

INSPIRED BY DANCING DOTS FROM DESIGNER NANCY MAHONEY (NANCYMAHONEY.COM) QUILTMAKER: LAURA BOEHNKE





Combine hard lines and soft curves as well as machine piecing and appliquéing methods in a batik throw. Fabrics are hand-dyed batiks from the Enchanted Journey Batiks collection by Patricia Lueker and Southwest Decoratives for Avlyn (avlyn.com).

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Materials

- 1/4 yard total assorted brownand-teal batiks (block A)
- ¾ yard total assorted light multicolor batiks (blocks A and B)
- ¾ yard total assorted tan batiks (blocks A and B)
- ½ yard total assorted teal batiks (blocks A and B)
- ½ yard total assorted purple batiks (blocks A and B)
- ½ yard total assorted brown batiks (block A)
- ½ yard brown geometric batik (block B, inner border)
- 1½ yards teal circle batik (outer border, binding)
- 25/8 yards backing fabric
- 46×66" batting
- Heat-resistant template plastic
- Spray starch
- Clear monofilament thread

Finished quilt: 39½×59½" Finished blocks: 10" square

Quantities are for 44/45"wide, 100% cotton fabrics.

Measurements include 1/4" seam allowances. Sew with right sides together unless otherwise stated.

Cut Fabrics

Cut pieces in the following order. Patterns are on page 5. The following instructions use a template-plastic-and-starch method to prepare appliqués. See Prepare Appliqués, right, before cutting out appliqué pieces A and B.

From assorted brown-and-teal batiks, cut:

 7—5½" squares, cutting each in half diagonally for 14 triangles total

From assorted light multicolor batiks, cut:

- 2—3×42" strips
- $16-3\times5\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles

From assorted tan batiks, cut:

- 7—5½" squares, cutting each in half diagonally for 14 triangles total
- 16-5½" squares

From assorted teal batiks, cut:

- 7—5%" squares, cutting each in half diagonally for 14 triangles total
- 8 of Pattern B

From assorted purple batiks, cut:

- 14 of Pattern A (7 sets of 2 matching pieces)
- 8 of Pattern B

From assorted brown batiks, cut:

 14 of Pattern A (7 sets of 2 matching pieces)

From brown geometric batik, cut:

- 2—3×42" strips
- 5—2×42" strips for inner border

From teal circle batik, cut:

- 5—3½×42" strips for outer border
- 5—2½×42" binding strips
- 4-5" squares

Prepare Appliqués

- Lay heat-resistant template plastic over patterns A and B. Trace each pattern once onto plastic. Cut out shapes on drawn lines, making sure to include the 1/4" seam allowance at ends of Pattern A, to make templates.
- Place a template right side down on wrong side of fabric indicated in cutting instructions and trace. Cut out appliqué shape, adding a scant 1/4" seam allowance to curved edges.

- 3. Spray a small amount of starch into a dish. Place template-topped appliqué piece on a pressing surface covered with a tea towel or muslin. Dip a cotton swab in starch and moisten seam allowance of appliqué piece (Diagram 1).
- **4.** Using tip of a hot dry iron, turn seam allowance over edge of template and press until fabric is dry. Press entire curved seam allowances in the same manner. adding starch as necessary and ensuring fabric is pressed taut against template. For A arcs, clip inner curve as necessary and do not press under seam allowances on ends. For B circles, you may wish to handstitch small running stitches 1/8" from the edges and pull them up to gather the fabric around the template before starching; this helps evenly distribute the bulk.
- **5.** Turn the appliqué over and press it from the right side; remove template.
- **6.** Repeat steps 2-5 to cut and prepare the number of appliqué pieces indicated in cutting instructions.

Assemble A Blocks

1. Sew together an assorted brown-and-teal batik triangle and an assorted light multicolor batik triangle to make a brown triangle-square (Diagram 2). Press seam toward brown-and-teal batik. The triangle-square should be 5½" square including seam allowances. Repeat to make a second, matching triangle-square. Repeat to make 14 brown triangle-squares total.

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- 2. Repeat Step 1 to make seven sets total of two matching brown triangle-squares.
- Using assorted tan batik triangles and assorted teal batik triangles, repeat steps 1 and 2 to make seven sets of two matching triangle-squares (Diagram 3).
- 4. Position a prepared purple batik A arc appliqué atop a brown triangle-square, aligning raw ends of arc with raw edges of triangle-square (Diagram 4). Baste or pin in place. Using clear monofilament thread and a narrow blind-hem stitch, sew along both curved edges to make a purple arc unit (for tips, see Better Blind-Hem Stitch on page 5). Trim away excess fabric behind appliqué, leaving a 1/4" seam allowance. Repeat to make a second, matching purple arc unit.
- Using matching brown batik A arc appliqués and teal trianglesquares, repeat Step 3 to make two matching brown arc units (Diagram 5).
- 6. Referring to Diagram 6, sew together two purple arc units and two brown arc units in pairs. Press seams in opposite directions. Join pairs to make block A. Press seam in one direction. Block A should be 10½" square including seam allowances.
- **7.** Repeat steps 4–6 to make seven A blocks total.

Assemble B Blocks

- Sew together an assorted light multicolor batik 3×42" strip and a brown geometric batik 3×42" strip to make a strip set (Diagram 7). Press seam toward brown strip. Repeat to make a second strip set. Cut strip sets into 16—3"-wide segments.
- 2. Sew together a 3"-wide segment and an assorted light multicolor batik 3×5½" rectangle to make a three-patch unit (Diagram 8). Press seam toward rectangle. The unit should be 5½" square including seam allowances. Repeat to make 16 three-patch units total.
- a. Center a prepared teal-andbrown batik B circle appliqué on a cream batik 5½" square; baste or pin in place (Diagram 9). Using clear monofilament thread and a narrow blind-hem stitch, sew around appliqué edges to make a teal circle unit. Repeat to make eight teal circle units total.
- **4.** Using prepared purple batik B circle appliqués, repeat Step 3 to make eight purple circle units.
- 5. Referring to Diagram 10, sew together two three-patch units, a teal circle unit, and a purple circle unit in pairs. Press seams toward circle units. Join pairs to make block B. Press seam in one direction. Block B should be 10½" square including seam allowances. Repeat to make eight B blocks total.

Assemble Quilt Center

Referring to Quilt Assembly
 Diagram, lay out blocks in five
 rows, alternating A and B blocks.

 Sew together blocks in each row.
 Press seams toward B blocks.

 Join rows to make quilt center. Press seams in one direction. The quilt center should be 30½×50½" including seam allowances.

Assemble and Add Borders

- **1.** Cut and piece brown geometric batik 2×42" strips to make:
 - 2—2×50½" inner border strips
 - 2—2×30½" inner border strips
- 2. Cut and piece teal circle batik 3½×42" strips to make:
 - 2—3½×50½" outer border strips
 - 2-3½×30½" outer border strips
- 3. Join a long inner border strip and a long outer border strip to make a long border unit. Press seam toward inner border strip. Repeat to make a second long border unit. Sew long border units to long edges of quilt center. Press seams toward border units.
- 4. Sew together a short inner border strip and a short outer border strip; press seam toward inner border strip. Add teal circle batik 5" squares to ends of joined strips to make a short border unit. Press seams toward squares. Repeat to make a second short border unit.
- 5. Sew short border units to remaining edges of quilt center to complete quilt top. Press seams toward border units.

Finish Ouilt

- **1.** Layer quilt top, batting, and backing; baste. Quilt as desired.
- **2.** Bind with teal circle batik binding strips.

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







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Better Blind-Hem Stitch

- A blind hem-stitch takes several straight stitches forward, one zigzag stitch, several more straight stitches, and one zigzag stitch. The straight stitches should pierce the foundation fabric right alongside the appliqué, and the zigzag stitches should just catch the appliqué edges.
- Use a size 60/8 embroidery needle in the machine, clear monofilament thread for the needle, and 60-weight thread in the bobbin.
- Set up your machine for a narrow (1 millimeter), short (1 millimeter) stitch.
